SPOTLIGHT ON CAREER CONNECTIONS

In my time at Pre Camp, I had the opportunity to chat with Mac Clark who is one of our program coordinators for this summer. She was telling me that her interests lie in Environmental Studies, more specifically marine biology. I quickly mentioned that one of GBC Alumni is an Assistant Professor at the University of California Davis in Marine Sciences. Immediately a connection was born. One of the benefits of being a GBCer is that we share a common experience which makes it that much easier to make a connection to an alumni you have never met. It isn't really a cold call, but a warm one. In helping to make the introduction of Anne and Mac, I was able to reconnect with Anne with whom I went to high school. Below is a spotlight on Anne Todgham's work in Marine Sciences.



Anne Todgham (camper from 1983 to 1989 and staff from 1990 to 1993) graduated in 2005 from the University of British Columbia with her PhD in Animal Physiology and began her postdoctoral work at University of California Santa Barbara in the Marine Science Institute. Upon completion of her research, in August 2009, she took a faculty position as Assistant Professor in Biology at San Franscisco State University. In January of this year, she moved to the University of California Davis.

Her love of nature and animals began at GBC. One of her fondest memories is of spending hours in the Coke stream turning over rocks and logs to see what was living under them. Her interest grew into wanting to understand the natural history of animals and why animals are able to live where they do. That passion continues today with her research into unfolding how well animals will deal with climate change. Do they have the capacity to deal with temperature changes, decreases in oxygen and changes in pH? Can animals flex their existing physiology to combat the changes or is there enough time to adapt to the change in climate?

Last fall, Anne led a team of graduate students and postdocs to McMurdo Station, Antarctica – the largest of the 3 research stations of the US Antarctic Program. Their goal was to come away with an understanding of how the future ocean may affect the development of life at its earliest stages. Research funded by the National Science Foundation's Office of Polar Programs, was focused on

learning how vulnerable or stress tolerant embryonic and juvenile Antarctic fishes are to future changes in temperature and CO2 levels. Antarctic fishes are considered especially vulnerable to changes in environmental conditions because they evolved in a very stable habitat over millions of years. Most of Anne's research took place in the Crary Aquarium at McMurdo Station where dozens of containers filled with water are kept at different temperatures and with varying amounts of carbon dioxide to simulate future best – and worst-case scenarios of ocean warming and acidification. ¹

We talked about Lake Bernard and how fortunate we are to have a lake that is clean and abundant with wildlife. Anne pointed out that lakes, like oceans, will see increases in temperature and decreases in oxygen that will be exacerbated by current environmental issues such as increased pollution from surrounding towns and farms. At most Universities across Canada and the rest of the world, scientists are looking for students to help them address questions related to the susceptibility of our animals to climate change.



Anne says GBC and the wonderful staff and campers played a large role in shaping who she is today. Her love of nature was fostered at GBC and she gained the confidence and skills to face challenging hurdles head on. Although it might be hard to believe, being a counsellor and leading canoe trips, prepares you for research field trips far and wide. So much of what Anne does is about being an effective team member, as well as leader. GBC was a springboard for Anne!

There is a willingness to take a risk, to try another new skill, to make another new friend. Her sense of who she is grows. Her confidence builds. A sense of belonging manifests. Her tendency for leadership starts to emerge. The possibilities are endless at camp.

Girls at GBC have the opportunity to sail, kayak, canoe, climb in a high ropes course, horseback ride, play guitar or try their hand at pottery or woodworking. They can learn about solar power, stargaze, make friendship bracelets, sing their hearts out, play a huge game of hide and seek and go on a canoe trip. They will conquer fears, laugh their heads off, cry, self reflect, feel at peace, jump in jubilation and bear hug their cabin mates. They will be who they are and we love watching it all unfold.
